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From The Rectory

The Greatest Story Ever Told

Easter is the greatest ever story of hope! Jesus's story is one where his resurrection smashes through the despair of death. It's a story of life overcoming death and goodness triumphing over evil.

We are surrounded by tales of woe - because life is tough. We can't switch off to what's happening round about us – that would be to deny our lived reality. But without hope, we may find ourselves spiralling into despondency. For the disciples, the crucifixion of Jesus, plunged them into grief and despair. On Holy Saturday it probably felt like there was no way out and no hope. Dreams were shattered; they were at once without direction or purpose. Everything would have felt meaningless. Some even walked away. It is a huge temptation when life gets tough to abandon our faith and yet that is precisely the time when we need faith the most; the time when we need hope. But for us, if we are truly resurrection people, we recognise the power of God in our lives and his way of overcoming all things. We know the story of Jesus overcoming even death itself as the one who is Resurrection; of his coming alongside those who were walking away, so that they would return and sing the song of life overcoming death and of God's mighty deeds. We know the narrative that God is working out his purpose in the world and that by the gift of the Holy Spirit in us, we the baptised are participants in Jesus' mission, today and tomorrow and until he comes in glory. Ours is the task of walking with those who stumble in despair at the burdens of life; of walking in the steps of Jesus alongside those who are without hope. Our churches all have stories of hope because Jesus is in the church. Where Jesus is present we can expect to see the transformation and signs of resurrection. If our work and our projects are 'of God' they will undoubtedly succeed; those things that are just about our own will and ambition, however, will fade and ultimately fail. All this is bound up in the story of the one who was crucified for us; who rose on Easter Day and who equipped his disciples to sing the song of God's wondrous love for humanity and the world. Today, as disciples of Jesus, we are tasked with the same mandate to serve in his name, to call people back to the Cross of Christ so that all may know the love and life-giving-ness of the Resurrection and by Jesus' love mingled with ours, to show the love of God our creator and redeemer in the world. This Easter let's all seek out the hope of Christ in fresh and substantial ways so that our hearts are set on fire with love for Him, and as we share this same hope in the communities we love and among the people we serve let us be people of the Resurrection for Christ is Risen and his Spirit is with us always.

BEING A CHRISTIAN IN ERITREA

Eritrea has been described as the "North Korea of Africa" and not without reason. According to Human Rights Watch the Eritrean government's human rights record is among the worst in the world. Since its independence in 1993 the country has been ruled under the iron hand of its president, Isaias Afuwerki. As far as religious rights are concerned, at least in theory, those belonging to the Catholic, Orthodox and Lutheran churches or the Islamic faith are granted freedom of religion. However, the situation on the ground is very different and members of other churches are persecuted relentlessly. Added to this, military service is required of every citizen. By law it should last for 18 months, but in reality it is indefinite. One group to suffer from this requirement to do military service is the Jehovah's Witnesses, who often refuse to enlist and, as a result, are detained indefinitely.

In April 2023 a group of 103 young Eritreans were arrested while trying to record a worship video to share online. "My life is in your hand," they sang, full knowing that public and private acts of worship outside the parameters of Eritrea's three permitted denominations put them at severe risk. They were taken to Mai Serwa prison, a place infamous for its unsanitary conditions, overcrowding and inhumane treatment of prisoners. It needs to be stated that prisons in Eritrea are nothing like the prisons we have in the West. For many to be sent to prison means spending months or even years cooped up in a shipping container in the desert. With temperatures reaching nearly 50 degrees during the daytime and plunging to near freezing at night it is hardly surprising that many do not live to tell the tale.

One who did live to tell the tale was the Gospel singer, Helen Berhane. She was imprisoned in the harshest of conditions for 32 months before being released into house arrest. Soon after, through the help of a Christian friend, she was



CANAL RAMBLINGS

We have a large compact fir tree in our garden which attracts a number of different birds, wood pigeons nest in it every year, Blue, Great and Coal tits forage in it for food, Britain's smallest bird the Goldcrest has nested in it and if I am lucky I see it nipping in and out looking for food. Goldfinches and Greenfinches use it for various reasons. Over the winter months we have our own mini Starling murmaration which can range from 20 to 40 Starlings, they gather in a small flock to fly in , do a couple of circles around the tree, fly off again only to return 30 seconds later and repeat the process, this can go on for around 5 minutes until a few birds land in the tree followed quickly by the rest of the small flock to roost for the night. This is when the chattering between the birds starts, I think they tell one another where to find food and water, what they have done during the day, say hello to old friends etc etc. This tiny murmaration is nothing to what Sue and I witnessed during a visit to R.S.P.B. Ham Wall reserve in October down in Somerset. The night we went an estimated 10,000 starlings joined the murmaration and were swirling around making all sorts of shapes flying over the reed beds, it was a fantastic spectacle to witness. We were brought back down to earth when the warden told us that during the peak murmaration in mid November there can be as many as 800,000 Starlings here, yes you read it right, 800,000 Starlings flying around, can you imagine the sights and sounds of nearly a million pairs of wings flying over your head and then the crescendo of chattering between the birds when they all eventually descend into the reed beds to roost for the night, now that would be a sensation for the senses. One of my walks takes me through a small wooded valley between Scholar Green and Mount Pleasant, a small stream runs through the middle of this wooded valley. While Monty was paddling in the stream I was standing at the top of the banking watching 2 Treecreepers, with no leaves on the trees at the moment it makes it so much easier to see the wildlife. While standing there I caught a movement out of the corner of my eye, I turned to see a Fox walking towards me along the path, I was screened by the tree trunks so it could not see me. When it got to around 10 yards from me it's head shot into the air, I realised it had obviously picked up my scent, if I had stepped out from behind the tree I would have frightened the poor Fox half to death so I moved my arm slightly, as soon as it saw the movement it trotted off into the undergrowth. The Fox was in excellent condition with a superb large bushy tail, he/she must have a good patch with plenty of food to keep it looking so healthy. This encounter didn't happen at dawn or dusk but in droad daylight so the Fox obviously felt comfortable being out during the day.

The best wildlife encounters happen when least expected. Meanwhile Monty was still paddling around in the stream oblivious to what was happening only 50 yards away.

Nothering

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers. Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers- all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of

Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families - which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name.

This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mothers' Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.
